Cecelia McMahon, East Street, E. P. Probationary certificate; State rebate per week, \$4.00

Mrs. Ellen Potter, Chippenhook, Qualification certificate; State rebate per week, \$3.00

The citizens at East Street are doing a very commendable piece of work in the renovation of this school building. I understand that a large playground will be provided by one of these citizens, new chemical toilets are to be installed and the plant put in first class condition. It will not be long now before there will be a "Standard" or "Superior" plate on this building.

A "Standard" plate has been placed on the building at East Clarendon as a result of the splendid work done by this Parent-Teacher Association.

Few people, who are not engaged in this kind of work, know the amount of labor that is involved in bringing about such an accomplishment.

Some excellent improvements have been made by the Parent-Teacher Association at the North Clarendon school. When such an association gets after it, the job is bound to be done. We hope to see a "Superior" plate on this building in the very near future.

The Parent-Teacher Association at Clarendon Springs is furnishing chair desks for this entire school.

The school spirit throughout the town is of a very substantial character.

I very much appreciate the hearty co-operation of all concerned for the welfare of the schools during the past four years.
