- B. Doris Ross, East Street, school, Qualification certificate; State rebate, \$3.00.

Cecelia McMahon, East Clarendon school, E. P. Standard certificate, State rebate \$5.00.

Mrs. Ellen Potter, Chippenhook school, Qualification certificate, State rebate, \$3.00.
